Thanks be to God for His bountiful gifts to us!

Santa Clara First Baptist Church has never witnessed such a generous one-day offering in its history. On Sunday, March 29, our people acted on God's answer to their prayer, "Lord, what would you have me do?" with respect to their gifts for our Renovation Campaign.

During a special worship moment our people came forward in both services and presented their First Gifts to the Lord's work. The next day our counters announced that day's total:

\$162,923!!

And this followed the most successful fund raising drive this church has experienced. On Saturday night at our Harvest Dinner our people joined the church leaders in presenting their two-year pledges for the campaign. Additional pledges were added on Sunday with the total amount pledged amounting to:

\$326.085!!

And it's quite possible that these totals will increase with the addition of more pledges and gifts from those who weren't able to be present this weekend. We also need to be aware that this total will be added to what has already been given by folks over the past two years that we have been preparing to launch this renovation.

God has been good to SCFBC. He has so transformed our hearts that we would open up our pocketbooks in these tough economic times and give generously to His work. Our prayer now needs to center on the wise and effective use of these funds towards the improvement and upgrading of these worship facilities.

But, remember, the goal of this campaign is not simply to put a better-looking face on an aging building. It's to demonstrate to a Christ-less valley that the message of the gospel is relevant to a new generation. It's to provide an up-to-date environment in which skeptical seekers will be welcomed and drawn in to experience the presence of the Lord and hear the changeless gospel that will save their souls.

In response to God's goodness it was fitting that we sang the Doxology in the morning service after presenting our First Gifts. Why not sing it again?

Book Review

Martin Luther King Jr. - American Hero - This is a very good book about Martin King Jr.'s life written for youth, and can be read by all ages It starts out when he was a young child focusing on being a preacher like his father and grandfather. He began practicing in front of the mirror after school every day. It ends up by detailing his work and the people he worked with in the Civil Rights movement.

Early History of Troop 14 at SCFBC

Frank Pierce and Len Walz became good friends, after working there years as co-leaders in the Gray-Y(YMCA) programs. A group of young boys that they had worked with in the Gray-Y program wanted to go into Boy Scouting. Frank and Len searched other Scout Troops in the local area that would take a group of young boys together in their existing troop. They were unable to find a single troop, that would take the group of boys (the boys wanted to stay together) at one time, even though Frank and Len offered to help in the troop. Frank and Len decided maybe they could start a new troop. They checked with the local Boy Scout office for requirements to start a new Scout Troop. They were given charter papers to fill out, and they needed an organization as a sponsor, plus an Institutional Representative from the sponsoring organization. When Len asked his church (Santa Clara First Baptist) if they would sponsor a Scout Troop: he learned that the church had sponsored a Troop in the past (Troop 14), but it had been dissolved a few years earlier. Frank and Len had a meeting with the church diaconate Frank Pierce Len Walz and presented the proposal for starting a new Boy Scout Troop. They were very enthusiastic about the idea of starting a new troop. After meeting again with the Scout office, they were able to reinstate Troop 14.

The Church Diaconate appointed Al Kieser to serve as the first Institutional Representative. After meeting with parents who were interested in their sons joining the Scouts and the Group of boys from Gray-Y, Troop 14 was re-activated in September 1967 with thirteen boys. The boys were as follows: Armand D'Alo, Reney Boisvert, Tom Dalrymple, Malcolm Hillan, John Kieser, Mike Kinser, Ron Kuka, Wick Loeswick, Steve Masdon, Greg Paape, Steve Painter, Frank Pierce and Gary Walz.

Mr. Stowell has provided exceptional support to the Boy Scouts of America during his many years here at SCFBC. But Glenn began this journey many years ago in his native home state of Boston, MA. When Glenn became part of the Boy Scout program a SCFBC. There existed not only Troop 14 BSA, but Cub Scout Pack 78 and since he had a son of Cub Scout age and as Glenn was the Churches' representative to Scouting, they both were soon involved with the Pack. In Glenn's position as a member and Ex Officio of the Adult Pack Committee which met monthly and he also attended the monthly Pack Meetings.



By October 1970, Troop 14 had 60 Scouts, two Eagle Scouts, 8 Life Scouts, 7 Star Scouts, 10 1st Class Scouts, 17 2nd Class Scouts, and 18 Tenderfoot Scouts. Troop 14 also had two Scouts working on the God and Country Award, 30 Scouts had earned the Historical Trails Award, 15 Scouts had earned the Fifty Miler Award, and, from September 1967 to October 1970, the Scouts had earned a total of 140 Merit badges. By 1971, the Troop had 12 Eagle Scouts and in 1972, added 2 more.

The Pack meeting consisted of The Dens, their Adult Leaders, Their Families, and was led by the Cub Master.
