
Youth News

Human Trafficking

is the fastest growing criminal industry in the world. We can be part of the movement to end it.

American Baptist International Missionary, Rev. Lauren Bethell is! Thank you to the SCFBC Lauren Bethell American Baptist Women (ABW) Circle for hosting the October 10 meeting and lunch. Lauren began in 1986 as an English teacher in Bangkok, only to be awakened to the problem of prostitution in the streets. She was so unnerved by what she saw that she researched the problem asking "why" was this happening and found no Christian agencies helping. By 1993 God called her into the ministry and she began by showing them God's love... in Bangkok, and then in Thailand where she helped found the "New Life Center" a safe house for girls. It wasn't only about prostitution, but it was the exploitation voung problem girls the trafficking. After many years in the trenches praying the girls off the street and showing God's never ending love, she is currently called to Amsterdam to train and provide networking for other Christian workers in the field because this is a **global problem** – it is everywhere on every continent. She founded the



International Christian Alliance to Prostitution (ICAP) (www.icapglobal.org) and has held four conferences with representatives from 75 countries. They network and equip practitioners and coordinate their efforts to end the global problem of human trafficking. ICAP focus is to unite people and organizations for Transformation and Hope. When asked, "What can we do in Santa Clara to help?" Lauren replied: continue to diligently pray for the girls and for the workers; pray for new skills and jobs for the girls and she thanked SCFBC for our continued monetary support. Her suggestions are: educate ourselves and others; research the problem; find out who is mobilized in our area and partner with them; support safe houses; and to be eyes and ears in our own neighborhoods.

On October 21-22 the Not For Sales's 3rd Annual Global Forum on Human Trafficking was held in Sunnyvale with 50 speakers. Over 600 people attended from all over the world. You can read more about it at www.notforsalecampaign.org or be a Facebook friend of notforsalecampaign. Human trafficking isn't just about prostitution, it's about approximately 30 million people including children, being abducted, forced into labor including making children soldiers at a young age; it's really about the loss of human dignity and civil rights. There are ways we can get involved in our own communities: educate the young, ourselves and others; attend training; seek justice; and defend the rights of the poor and needy. As consumers we can spend wisely at the cash register – go to FREE2WORK.org and download an app that can scan bar codes and reports if a product has been made by legitimate labor or by slave labor with grades A-F, with A being the best. In the bay area we can volunteer with the South Bay Coalition to End Human Trafficking (see www.sbcht.org) for hands-on participation. Helping students, schools and orphanages is a positive action. Together we can end slavery!

Renovation Update!

The carpet on the stage is done and really helps tie in the colors of the walls to the front of the sanctuary. Thanks again to Steve Erling for coordinating the carpet install with his installers. We are also finishing up the stage fascia this week. We hired a shipwright, a friend of Tom Caldwells, to laminate the complicated curves on the stage face and then add walnut veneer to the face and hardwood walnut to the top. It is looking amazing and will add a nice touch to the front of the stage.



Tom Caldwell and John Pusateri did a great job of getting all the vertical slats painted on the stage before the carpet went in and John also finished all the walnut wood work in the sound booth along with the varnishing. Jun Lagmay came in and repainted the red walls on the stage in flat paint to help the wall not reflect light as much. They came out looking a lot cleaner then before.

The stained glass window project is ending up being more of a challenge then we thought. We love the clean modern look of the windows without the colored plastic, but the sun beams that come in during the morning



worship service are still too intense. Though in the afternoon after the sun has moved the windows look incredible. We tried adding plastic tinting to the insides of the windows but that is still not cutting it. Thank you to Liz Poche, Will Weeks, and Joel Robinson for helping to install the plastic panels. We are currently looking at a large sheer drape system with two rods that can be used during the winter time when the sun is low to cut down the sun beam intensity, and use the second rod as a complete black out drape for special services. We are not sure if this is the final solution and will evaluate the quotes as they come in.

Will Weeks and Jerry installed the new lower speaker onto the ceiling speaker cluster. We also re-aimed the speaker cluster to provide better coverage to the front and rear rows of the sanctuary.

Jerry and Will Weeks also repainted the handicap spots in the parking lot to comply with the new handicap accessibility codes. We had to remove the two handicap spots that were up against the curb and move them into the main center parking stalls. A new sign for these new stalls will be added soon.

Matt McLenegan and Will Weeks took on the very messy job of caulking the outside of all the new windows. Their hands were a mess for a couple of days but they did a great job on sealing the windows from the oncoming rain. The upper outside windows were back ordered and should be coming in this week so we can finish the windows and paint the frames.

October Church Work Day: The last Church Work Day took place on Saturday, October 15th and resulted in many different projects getting started and/or completed. Work Items that still need to be completed: Property fencing (FH lot), security of roof access points (Sanctuary & Ed Wing), re-setting exterior lights (daylights saving time), re-setting irrigation to "winter schedule", tool room clean up, new sheet rock installation on ceiling, and new carpet installation.

Future Projects: The Property Department is looking into various projects for 2012 and beyond including: Youth Room remodel/upgrade, exterior painting, playground equipment changes, Ed Wing remodeling/upgrades, re-paveing of both parking lots, and installing solar power, just to name a few.

Bethlehem Storage Building: The exterior lights and electrical outlets have been completed and we will also be completing the roof gutters and down spouts soon. The Santa Clara Fire Dept. has given us their final inspection, and we will be getting the City Building Department to sign off on the building itself soon (after the building is empty when setting up for Bethlehem). Painting will be done possibly on the Bethlehem side of the building before the performances in December. After these items are completed, we will then put up the fencing and gates around the building.

Sanctuary Remodeling: Everything is coming to a close with the work and it all looks AMAZING. The Property Dept. is so very thankful for all of the volunteers who worked so hard to bring this project to completion! Carpeting of the stage area was recently completed and the remainder of the Sanctuary's main floor will hopefully be completed before Christmas. Please see Jerry Cintas' article for more information.

Reminder: Please make sure that when you leave a building, classroom, etc. that all the doors are locked, windows closed, all lights and air/heat turned off. Thanks for helping keep our utility expenses to a minimum.

The ability to find materials in the Library was a valuable element of the library that was missing! This is exciting - bringing the SCFBC Library into the 21st century! It will open new doors that we have praying about – of being able to start a lending library for shut-ins – people who will be able to choose their own materials to read or watch or listen to. We aren't ready to start this ministry quite yet – but we are working on it. If this is a ministry you are called to – delivering books and visiting shut-ins once a month, please contact one of us on the Library Committee and we will be one step closer. Maybe you haven't wanted to touch all the books and get dusty, so you haven't joined the Library Committee in the past, but if you like to drive around the area and enjoy visiting with those who are home bound, this may be the perfect ministry for you.

Life Groups 2.0

As we soon enter a new year we are improving the existing small group ministry of our church. We're calling it Life Groups 2.0. While maintaining our basic approach, we are making some exciting changes. Below are some FAQ that explain our new direction:

What is a Life Group?

Life Groups are the small groups that meet in homes and other places around the Silicon Valley. They give people in SCFBC a chance to get to know each other, make friends, support each other and grow in their faith. We offer a range of Life Groups for all ages and with assorted interests.

What is different about the new Life Groups format?

The biggest change about the new Life Groups format is that all the groups will operate on a trimester calendar—they will start at the same time, meet for approximately twelve weeks, and then break for a month. Our Winter/Spring trimester begins the week of January 8th.

What happens during the month break?

Between each trimester will be a Promotion Month. At this time, new Life Groups may be formed, new leaders recruited, and most importantly everyone will need to decide what Life Group they want to be in during the next trimester.

Why are we changing the Life Groups?

Up until now, many people in our church have been in Life Groups and thoroughly enjoyed it. However, lots of people are hesitant to join a group that has been meeting together for years. Or they are nervous about getting roped into one group with no escape until death, or until Jesus comes! Using a trimester system eliminates these issues. Having a calendar cycle like this also allows people to lead groups for some trimesters, and still be able to take off a trimester if they need to.

But I like the Life Group I'm already in. Can I still be in the same Life Group?

Of course you are welcome to sign up for any group you want, and if you want to continue with the same leader (if the leader chooses to lead the same group), you can choose to sign up for that in the next trimester. Some groups may take additional trimesters to finish a study (i.e., "Genesis, Part 1 and Part 2").

I heard we may have groups that play games or go hiking together! What kinds of Life Groups will I have to choose from?

The purpose of offering a variety of Life Groups is to give people a chance to spend time together, make friends, and learn about the Lord. While we will always have classic Bible study Life Groups, some of the special interest groups or book groups may appeal to people who want to introduce their friends to the church in a more relaxed setting.

So how do I sign up?

Our first Promotion Month will begin in November. You will be given a "catalog" of Life Groups and during a worship service, you can indicate on your registration card that you put in the offering plate which Life Group you want to try. The Life Group leader will contact you with all the information.

This is an amazing opportunity for our church to grow and mature both as individuals and as a body. Please pray for this ministry—for the people who may be invited to come to Life Groups, and for the leaders as they makes preparations.

The ASANTE Children's Choir November 12, 2011



In 1999, four years after the Rwandan genocide that claimed more than one million people, Amon Munyaneza the founder of Asante Children's Choir had an opportunity to return to his home country of Rwanda after more than thirty years in exile. Amon grew up as a refugee child in Uganda after his parents fled Rwanda in the 1950's during the civil war that claimed and displaced thousands of his people. Upon his return to Rwanda, Amon realized that thousands of children in Rwanda were roaming the streets naked, hungry and desperate for care. Having grown up as a refugee child with very little, he quickly identified with the children of Rwanda and with only thirty dollars to his name, he founded an organization that would raise awareness for the desperate plight of the Rwandan children. By 2007, the organization was supporting close to one thousand children in Rwanda and running two fulltime schools for the most disadvantaged children in Butare, the Southern province of Rwanda.

"Asante" is a Swahili word translated "Thank You" in English. The current ASANTE children's choir is made up of 24 children from East Africa, a region recovering from years of civil war and genocide that have claimed millions of lives leaving thousands of children and women as orphans and widows. The choir is dedicated to spreading love, hope and joy while raising awareness for the desperate plight of orphans and other vulnerable children. Their colorful clothing, pounding drums and sweet voices demonstrate their hope and dream for a brighter future. Their inspirational stories of resilience have instilled hope in the hearts of all those who have seen them perform. The children who have been rescued from some of life's most difficult circumstances take pride in expressing gratitude through their music. Their performances are the true testimonies and living "Thank-You" (Asante) notes sang to everyone who has invested in their lives giving them great pride and hope for a brighter future.
