

Today, 11,000 kids under the age of 5 will die just from causes related to hunger. That's one child every seven seconds.

Our youth group at SCFBC wants to do something about this tragedy. On March 30-31 they will participate in World Vision's 30 Hour Famine fundraiser. For every \$30 raised one hungry child will be provided with food for a month.

Food Pantry: We accept non-perishable food items from contributors and redistribute it to those in need. It is available in a two-bag distribution to people who ask for a food donation at the office. The bags are prepared and six sets are available at all times. The web site says that food bags can be picked up the last week of the month. Food bags are available to people who attend church or to your friends in need also. Please let people know.

Fellowship Fund: You can donate to this fund by indicating "Fellowship Fund" on your giving envelope or ask for funds from it by contacting Pastor Rich if you have a financial need that the Fellowship Fund might assist you in paying. This fund helps others in their hour of need with a helping hand for unexpected bills or expenses.

Good Samaritans: Maxine Darknell coordinates a group of people who help others with little chores that they may not be able to handle for a variety of reasons. Could be food preparation or giving rides for medical appointments - things like that. Call Maxine if you need help or if you want to be available to help others with chores like this. Sometimes we just can't do it all alone, call Maxine at 241-7567.

Visitation: What a blessing it is when I hear that a Life Group visited the shut-ins or people recovering from an operation. We are here to help out and extend a hand of comfort to each other. If you would like a visit or would like to be the one visiting people, please let Jerri Cooper know, it is such a blessing.

Are you considering baptism or membership with Santa Clara First Baptist Church? Do you want to know more about it? Ask Pastor Rich about how you can do this. The next Membership class called "Back to Basics" will be held on **March 17th from 9am - 12:30pm**. Please call the church office to register your intent to attend.

Prayer Chain: Do you want to be added to the SCFBC email prayer chain? Trudy coordinates the email prayer chain and once a prayer request is given to her, she forwards it to a list of nearly 100 homes so others can pray over the request also. One of those people picks up the request and starts a telephone prayer chain with another dozen or so households. Call Jerri Cooper if you have questions about the prayer chains.



What Can the Church Learn from Facebook?

In many ways, the church in the 21st century has more in common with the 1st-century church than at any time in history. We are a small minority, operating in society hostile to us. We are surrounded by violence, selfishness and hardship. And yet we know from scripture that the 1st- century church was alive, vibrant, and effective to a degree that changed the world! What can we learn from that example?

Believe it or not, I think we can learn a lot from Facebook. What is it about that social networking site that attracts more than 700 million people to actively use it? Obviously, something resonates with people. Facebook's stated purpose is to "help you connect and share with the people in your life"—and I suspect that that is the key! In my experience using Facebook, I see examples all the time of people sharing their lives with family and friends old and new. Here are a few scenarios:

- Parents and grandparents announcing babies on the way;
- Teens revealing painful breakups, and their friends rallying around them with words of comfort;
- Deaths of loved ones and outpouring of support and condolences;
- Silly things like the banter of friendly rivalries about football or hockey;
- Urgent calls for prayer for a variety of reasons;
- The fear and frustration of lost jobs & the joy and celebration of new jobs;
- And sharing photos chronicling all kinds of events from vacations to graduations.

It's not about the technology—it's about relationships

The technology isn't the point here (although it certainly makes connecting convenient). The popularity of Facebook gives us a clue to what people are hungry for—the chance to belong, connect and interact with others. It's reaching out to people, and having them reach out to you. It's the sharing of our lives. This is what people desperately crave, and what the church should provide.

The Bible has over fifty "one another" statements that describe how the church body—all of us—should act. Here are just a few:

"Love one another" (John 13:34)	"Accept one another" (Romans 15:7)
"Be at peace with one another" (Mark 9:50)	"Encourage one another" (1 Thess. 3:12)
"Be devoted to one another in brotherly love" (Romans 12:10)	"Don't grumble against each other" (Jas 5:9) "Build each other up" (1 Thess. 5:11)
"Stop passing judgment on one another" (Romans 15:7)	"Carry each others burdens" (Gal. 6:2)
"Submit to one another" (Ephesians 5:19)	"Forgiving each other" (Ephesians 4:32)
"Pray for each other" (James 5:16)	"Instruct one another" (Romans 15:14)

When we wonder what God wants for SCFBC —what kind of church we want to be known for—these verses (and all the other "one another" verses) might be the best place to start!

30 HOUR FAMINE



The Jr. High and High School youth will be participating in an overnight event where they will go 30 hours without food to bring awareness of world hunger and raise money to help save lives. Every \$30 raised will feed and care for a hungry child for a month. This program is run through World Vision (http://www.30hourfamine.org) and many churches around the world will be participating as we are.

The event will take place on March 30th – 31st in the fellowship hall. During the event there will be videos, lessons, and activities to learn more about poverty and poor living conditions. The youth will experience what it is like to not live in a warm home, instead sleeping in cardboard shelters in the church playground on Friday night in their sleeping bags. On Saturday during the

day, we will take the kids offsite to participate in a service project.

Students may approach you between now and then with envelopes for collecting sponsor names and money. We would like all donations to be written as checks to "World Vision" rather than cash and be given to the youth or youth leaders. Last year we raised over \$5,000 for World Vision.

Inspired by a true story, Tyler's prayers take the form of letters he sends to his ultimate pen pal, God. This story delivers a message of hope, with the courage that others can apply to their own personnel struggles regardless of what they face in the everyday lives.

A Letter to Dad (2008) (DVD) Do the words "dysfunctional family" ring any bells for you? This film, based on a true story, is touching and shows how faith and love can overcome a lifetime of pain and anger. This Dove Foundation approved movie is powerful. When Dan Donahue finally met the woman of his dreams and decided to marry her, he had to step back and evaluate the situation. He confronts his feelings of bitterness head on as he pours out his heart in a letter to his father.
