MISSIONS SURVEY SUMMARY

As of August 20th 100 surveys have been submitted. The initial in-worship survey did not include the Impact Life Group and others actively involved in missions, so their responses are not reflected in these results. Surveys turned in since then only partially account for all the people who missed taking the original survey.

After tabulating the multiple choice and T/F questions, the following conclusions could be made:

The majority of people think they're doing too little. (46 out of 100, 33 didn't answer) 60% of respondents are in Life Groups.

35% give at least 10% of their offering directly to missions by indicating their gift on their giving envelope.

20% say they only give to missions when there's a disaster.

The most common reason for not supporting missions was lack of money; the second most common was lack of time.

The following table summarizes the percentage of responders involved (by financial and/or active participation) and the percent actively involved in each of the SCFBC-sponsored mission outreach opportunities.

For People on the Grow!

Learn to read all over again!

When you read the Bible, do you ever feel like the words "go in one ear and out the other"? Through the Apprentice Study this year I learned a skill that has been practiced by believers for centuries. Lectio divina, (pronounced "Lec-tsee-oh Di-vee-nah"), literally means "divine reading." Perhaps "divine listening" would be more accurate. This spiritual practice gives God the opportunity to communicate with us and to show us His will. The following exercise is based on *The Good and Beautiful God*, by James Bryan Smith.

Steps of Lectio Divina

Select a passage from the Bible. To begin with, try Psalm 23 or 1 Cor. 13. Spend a few minutes relaxing and breathing deeply in order to quiet your thoughts before God.

First Reading—Read through the passage slowly, pausing between each phrase or clause. (i. e., "The Lord is my shepherd," [pause] "I shall not be in want," [pause]...). After you finish the passage, sit silently and let the words soak in.

Second Reading—Read through the passage again, pausing between phrases for a little longer this time. Pay close attention to words or phrases that seem to stand out to you. Make a mental note of those words and phrases, and after this second reading, write them down.

Third Reading—Reread the passage up to the word or phrase that impacted you before. When you reach that word or phrase, stop and repeat it several times.

Pondering—Sit quietly and reflect on the phrase that touched you. Just let the words and your thoughts interact as you mull it over. Allow personal memories or other verses to come to mind. Ask yourself, "What might God be trying to say to me?"

Prayer—Make that question a prayer and take time to listen. Write down anything that you sense God might be trying to tell you.

Rest—Don't rush off. Enjoy this time with God by being still and basking in His company.

Response—Ask yourself what you think you might be called to do as a result of your time with God. Think about specific steps you can take to apply what you have experienced.

Finally, don't go into this expecting to have a dramatic spiritual experience (although that often happens). The purpose of lectio divina is to listen to God—giving Him the space to work in you. As with any new skill, it may feel awkward at first—that's normal. Keep practicing lectio divina and you will find that it becomes increasingly natural and rewarding.

SPECIAL ABW PROJECT FOR 2010-2011

"Surgical Care for Stigmatized Women in Democratic Republic of Congo" is a long title for a significant mission project. The success of the project will make a huge difference in the lives of women who suffer 'fistulas' caused by difficult labor/birth or violent physical attacks, including rape.

Women with fistulas become incontinent; in addition to suffering constantly from their physical internal injury, they suffer profound psychological trauma resulting from their utter loss of status and dignity. They are treated as contemptible and are literally pushed out of their families, their homes and their villages.

Fistulas can be repaired with surgery costing only \$60. The ABW of SCFBC feel called to help these African women who are so direly in need of healing. Our goal is to raise \$6,000 so that 100 women in the Congo can be returned to wholeness in body, in spirit, and in society. Be on the watch for more information in the future about how to join the ABW's fund-raising efforts.

Renovation Update

Things are coming to an end for the renovation. We have finished most of the main work now that the main construction and electrical phases are done.

Both screens and screen walls are completed as is all the behind-the-screen work. Thank you to Duane Esquibel for helping Adam with a lot of the sheet rock installation. On the stage we still have a couple of platforms to build, the cross to hang back into position, the side slatted walls to paint, handrails and acoustic panels to install, and the stage area to carpet. The front of the stage still needs the fascia board installed and placement of the speaker grills.

We finally cut into the copy room last week and set a new door to improve access in and out of the office area. The copy room cabinets had to be rearranged which resulted in making the room feel larger. Thank you to Steve Erling's carpet installers for patching the carpet for no charge.

Our last big project is working on the rear stained glass window. We have experimented with removing the colored plastic inserts that were in the window frames and noticed that a lot more natural light comes into the room which also makes the room feel more welcoming. There were a lot of broken windows and water damage so we are going to install new double pane windows with Low-E glass coatings into the existing window frames and remove the plexiglass exterior screen. We will then put a frost film and tinting on the windows to help diffuse the sun that comes into the room during the winter months.

Tom Caldwell has been very busy finishing up the painting in the sanctuary. We want to thank him very much for the time that he has been volunteering. There is still a lot of touch up and cut-ins that have to be done as well as some ceiling cracks that keep on coming back that we need to repair.

We have also been selling a lot of the old sound equipment on Craigslist and putting that money towards the renovation as well as cleaning up the clutter that is around.



Heart for Uganda

In July, Daena Yuksel spent 2 weeks serving the people of Uganda. Below is a letter and some pictures recounting some of her experience there.

Dear Friends,

The phrase "thank you" does not seem adequate to express my heart at this moment. Going on this mission trip to Uganda has transformed my life, rejuvenated my soul, strengthened my faith, and enabled me to love and befriend many people in Barakalo, Uganda.

After a 25-hour flight, we safely landed in Kampala and rested before an early morning 10-hour drive to Barakalo. During that drive, the road became a footpath and the footpath became overgrown with bushes. I was completely content to be walking deep in rural Africa where neither cars nor foreigners usually venture.

My first impression of Barakalo and most of Uganda was hopeful. Children were well nourished, wearing bright smiles and singing songs of joy. Water wells were plentiful and the crops looked strong and fruitful. The problems of Uganda are not easily visible. In fact, they are much deeper and more complicated than can be seen. The education system is not strong, owing to the limited number of teachers and resources. Malaria and HIV is rampant and was evident in every family I met. Religion is incorporated into the daily school routine. However, it is a dangerous mixture of Christianity, Islam and witchcraft.

Every morning after a short devotional and songs of praise, we worked alongside teachers and parents in the construction of a classroom. The children were delighted to see and touch us, and the construction workers looked rather amused as we carried heavy bricks and messy cement. The afternoons were spent doing home visits. A truly remarkable and humbling experience for me was sitting with an African mother as she explained how her children and husband had died of AIDS. Another mother cried that her babies are deathly sick from malaria. We paid visits to orphans whose parents had both died from AIDS. Some of the most satisfying moments of my time in Africa were holding sweet Ugandan hands while praying with these people in need, looking into their eyes and saying, "You are so worthy". I was encouraging them to be strong and hopeful because someone far away in America will be constantly praying for them.

I encountered many other wonderful people and was able to visit a few of the successful *Food for the Hungry* projects including: a well restoration project, a village savings and loan group, and the *New Life Center*, which rehabilitates former child slaves. However, nothing compared to the feelings of love and peace that I had during the home visits, when I felt the presence of Jesus most. God led me down this individual path in order to fulfill His perfect will in those moments.

The last day of my trip was sad but also beautiful. My wallet was still thick from the money you all so generously gave. After hearing the many stories of people sick with malaria, I decided to use the money for mosquito nets. We bought **400** nets at **\$3.00** each so that every child registered with *Food for the Hungry* in Uganda can be supplied with a net.

Now that I am home, I am constantly reminded that a mission trip is not just an event; it is a lifestyle. It is my intention to use the experiences of my trip to Uganda to fuel my passion for service to our Lord Jesus while continuing to seek opportunities to love in tangible and non-tangible ways. Your contribution to this mission trip has changed the lives of people hurting in a far away part of the world, and helped to nurture my soul in a way that no other experience can. I am deeply grateful.
