

Renovation Update

Things are coming very close to an end. When you see the sanctuary carpet go down in the next couple of weeks that will be the last major change.

Adam is busy finishing up the large rear window in the sanctuary by installing all new wood and new double pane windows. It is going to look awesome when he finishes, and the new windows will help reduce the amount of heat coming into the sanctuary. The window construction has changed slightly to improve the water protection on the outside of the window. Also you may have noticed recently that new acoustic panels have been installed on the stage walls.





Thank you to Will Weeks for helping with the two-day installation process. Tom Caldwell should be doing some final painting on the stage and ceilings this coming week to finish off the sanctuary painting.

The stage front is still on hold as we are evaluating the stage wall colors and acoustic panel fabric so we can pick the final finishes for the front of the stage. We are looking to install walnut fascia along the top of the stage and a glued on fabric that matches the acoustic panels along the bottom.

Lloyd and Jerry have been finishing up the remaining electrical jobs and wiring up all of the floor pockets on the stage with microphone, speaker, and electrical connections.

Our finances towards the end of the project have been a little unstable as we experienced a \$20,000 accounting error in the church books. We were on track to end the project in the black, but with this news it looks like we might run into the red. If you are continuing to give, we appreciate your donations as they are being put to good use as we put the final finishes on this project.

How to Stand Out From Other Christians

Most of us agree that Christians should be different than the general population. We hope that people can see something in us that intrigues them. But maybe the real question should be, when compared to typical, self-described Christians in America, do we stand out in the crowd, or are we one of the pack? Many Christians take great pride in being patriotic Americans, and after the anniversary of 9/11 the media focused on what it means to be an American. But studies suggest that few Christians put that same passion and self-identification into being a citizen of the Kingdom of God. In a recent article published by Barna Group, studies reveal four obstacles that hinder people from growing from a nominal, shallow relationship, to a mature, deep relationship with God.



Obstacles to Spiritual Growth

Commitment

While 4 out of 5 self-identified Christians point to a meaningful commitment that they made about their faith, only 18-22% claim to be "totally committed to their own spiritual development" and are "totally dependent on God."

Repentance

The majority of self-described Christians acknowledge the importance of confessing their sins to God and receiving His forgiveness. But few (12%) admit that they have truly pondered the significance of their sin, and have been devastated by it. Only about 3% have come to "the places where they have surrendered control of their life to God, submitted to His will for their life, and devoted themselves to loving and serving God and other people."

Activity

Pastor Rich has talked about the epidemic of busyness in the American culture. In fact, these studies confirm that most Christians confuse religious activity with spiritual growth and depth. While many Christians say that they have participated in "normal" religious activities in the past week such as praying, going to church, reading their Bible, few have engaged in deeper faith expressions: less than 1 out of 10 have talked about their faith with a non-Christian, fasted, and had an extended time of spiritual reflection. Nor have they practiced spiritual disciplines such as solitude, sacrifice, acts of service, silence, and scriptural meditation.

Spiritual Community

Most self-described Christians in the studies say that they are comfortable being around other Christians at church, but measures used in the studies show that the majority of these relationships do not have the depth and quality described in Scripture. Only 1 out of every 5 believes that "spiritual maturity requires a vital connection to a community of faith."

So What?

The implications of these studies are startling. The sad fact is that most of us do not live what we believe. We try to fit God into our lives in a convenient and socially acceptable way, and the church is apparently failing in its responsibility to teach, encourage and lead people into the deep, vital relationship that God craves for us. But don't blame the church—no church can do our part in our spiritual growth. We have to own up and take responsibility (with the Holy Spirit) for the quality and depth of our relationship with God. I challenge every person at SCFBC to read and reflect on Colossians 3:1-17. Let's not be content with where we are, but pursue the Lord with patriotic zeal!

Lauran was born and raised in an American Baptist pastor's family in central California. She graduated from the University of Redlands with degrees in psychology, religion and education. She then spent six years teaching elementary school.

In 1978 Lauran went to Hong Kong to teach in the Hong Kong International School where she was challenged by an American Baptist missionary to seriously consider missionary service. As a result, she returned to the States to pursue her Masters of Divinity at the American Baptist Seminary of the West. She was then ordained at the First Baptist Church of Fresno, Ca.



She was appointed by International Ministries in 1985 to teach in China with the Amity Foundation, but shortly had to return to the U.S. for back surgery. After her recovery, Lauran was reassigned to Thailand to complete her term.

While studying the Thai language in Bangkok, Lauran discovered that thousands of young women and girls in Thailand work in brothels, nightclubs and massage parlors scattered throughout the country in order to support their parents and siblings. During this time ABC missionaries Paul and Elaine Lewis were also becoming concerned about the plight of young hill tribe women who were being tricked, sold and going into prostitution because of the dire poverty of their families. They invited Lauran to serve as director of a center, which would offer these young women economic and spiritual alternatives to prostitution. In 1987 Lauran helped create the New Life Center where Jesus Christ was introduced to the women and they received job training and provided a safe haven at the New Life Center.

Lauran presently serves as global consultant - an at-large missionary who specializes in a particular area of need. She left Thailand after a few years and relocated to the Czech Republic in 2000. In the Czech capital of Prague she helped form Project Hope. In 2005, Lauran was awarded the Baptist World Alliance human rights award on July 31 at the group's centenary congress in Birmingham England. She was recognized for nearly 20 years of service in ministry to women, children and men exploited by sex trafficking.

"I have always felt that it was God's work", said Bethell. "I was just the happy helper and colleague of many, many people who felt as passionate as I did about sharing God's love with exploited and abused women and children."
